President Sure Of Food Supply

Improvement In Situation Pledged By Truman; Eisenhower Commended

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 21.—(AP)—President Truman promised improvement in the meat situation and forecast a single control over prices and food at a press conference today, his first outside the White House.

At the press conference—attended by his host, Gov. Mon C. Waigren and by United States Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, of Seattle—the President also:

Expressed confidence the senate would ratify the Bretton Woods world monetary agreements and gratification over its approval of legislation to extend the reciprocal trade program;

Termed General Eisenhower a grand gentleman who is entitled to anything he wants, and asserted the President would see that gets;

Endorsed a measure calling for creation of a Columbia valley authority;

Told reporters the San Francisco united nations conference was a success and that he would leave for home Monday to address his closing session Tuesday after stopping off in Portland, Ore.;

Answered questions on no plans for lowering the age for discharging soldiers, adding that it is a matter strictly for the military;

Wants Road Finished

And President Truman came out flatly in favor of postwar completion of the Alaska highway in cooperation with the governments of Canada and British Columbia.

The President said he had no cabinet in response to a question he denied reports he was getting rid of Interior Secretary Harold Ickes Tuesday, adding he had nothing on reports of a change in the state department headed by Secretary Stettinius.

Destroyer Sunk By Jap, 'Baka Bomb'

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(UP)—The American destroyer *USS Abner D. Noble* was sunk off Okinawa April 12 with 81 killed and 100 missing. The ship was struck by a Jap suicide plane and "baka bomb," the navy disclosed.

It was the first disclosure of an American ship hit by a baka bomb, a rocket-propelled projectile launched from a plane and guided to its target by a double attack.

The destroyer was on picket duty off the embattled island when the double attack was launched.

A single-engine Zek fighter dived through the Abele's blazing anti-aircraft fire and crashed on the destroyer's starboard side. It penetrated the deck and exploded in the room where its bomb exploded, breaking the vessel's shaft and keel.

The *Noble* was hit by a baka bomb skimming above the water at more than 100 miles an hour and crashed into the forward fire room at the starboard waterline. Many crew members were trapped in compartments below deck and went down with the ship. Several were killed when an enemy plane dropped a bomb among survivors on a small raft used in abandoning ship.

Goering Taking 18 Pills Daily To Quieten Nerves

PARIS, June 21.—(INS)—An allied headquarters spokesman disclosed today that Adolf Hitler was a drug addict months before Germany disintegrated, and said the German leader now was being allowed daily doses to keep him from becoming a "hanging judge" while his trial.

News of Hitler's drug addiction came after the death of Dr. Karl Brandt, German minister of health, who had administered the drug to the leader. Brandt was the first to admit the use of the drug, the nature of which was not disclosed. The spokesman said he now was permitted to take 18 pills daily to prevent lunacy.

An exhaustive questioning of Brandt by Col. Gen. Alfred Jodl, Hitler's personal chief of staff for 10 years, disclosed that the allied invasion of north Africa came as a "complete surprise" to the Nazi high command.

Monty Says Nazis Must Be Guarded

General Warns Of Peril Ahead

IN GERMANY, June 21.—(AP)—Field Marshal Montgomery declared today that Germany's general staff must be broken up and isolated in camps outside the Reich and the nation watched closely in the critical years ahead for any attempts by Nazi factions to prepare a third world war.

He asserted the army of occupation would have to remain in the Reich for an estimated six to 10 years because of the danger that Germany would automatically be straightened out as soon as the Allies were completely in control of another war and that German SS troops might have to be kept in prison camps.

"I don't agree," the marshal said in an interview, "with people who say Germany is down and out. The country is down and needs watching."

The British commander asserted that 1,000,000 Germans to be demobilized in the British zone are young officers who are annoyed that Germany is down and want a chance to start another one.

Women Too

Also included in the hundreds of German women of the army and air force auxiliary corps. The girls, between the ages of 18 and 21, were described by Montgomery as having "red-hot" British beliefs, and he said it would be impossible to screen out these girls from the demobilization process.

The British government previously set 1,150 calories daily as the standard diet it expected the German people to provide for themselves.

Montgomery said the British had this extra food for German civilians, but that no food had yet been received from Germany.

He said the British had a great transportation problem in getting the food produced in the British zone to the cities within the zone.

Railways are being repaired, but for the most part, Montgomery pointed out, they are not working. Only 10,000 tons a day is given to France, Belgium, Holland, Denmark, and the Netherlands.

House Republicans Act To Curb OPA

Martin Holds Agency's 'Bungling' Responsible For Food Shortages

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(AP)—Republicans moved today to strip OPA of all authority over food, as their house leader, Representative Martin, of Massachusetts, declared "bungling and inefficiency" have brought America "to the brink of war."

Proposing a recommendation by Herbert Hoover, Representative Jenkins, Republican of Ohio, proposed an OPA amendment to transfer food pricing and rationing powers from Chester Bowles to Agriculture Secretary J. I. Seay.

'Vinegar Joe' To Succeed Buckner; Noted Flier To Head New B-29 Unit

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(INS)—With Okinawa wars, the United States army gave Japan a double dose of bitter medicine today.

To Fight On Asia

The new commander of the 10th army, Stilwell, today announced the opinion that the final struggle in the war against Japan will take place on the Asiatic mainland.

Formerly commander of allied forces in the China-Burma-India theater, Stilwell was ousted from that post after nearly three active years in the theater because of friction with Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek.

Odd Lot Shoes Will Be Sold Without Stamps

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(UP)—The OPA announced tonight that at least 25 per cent of the women's odd lot shoes will be released to the public ration-free and without stamps through July 28.

The shoes must be sold at prices at least 25 per cent below retail prices. Dealers will be requested to mark down prices for more than one pair to a customer.

Children's and youth's shoes will be included in the release.

An estimated that about 1,400,000 pairs of men's shoes and 3,100,000 pairs of women's shoes will be available for sale without a ration coupon.
